

A Brief History of the Upper Arlington Fourth of July Celebration

This overview covers main elements of Upper Arlington's Fourth of July Celebration and is not intended to be a detailed history. The narrative and the attached list are created from newspaper records, the book *History of Upper Arlington*, and first-hand accounts. Content additions and corrections are welcome.

Fourth of July Organization

The first UA Fourth of July Celebration was organized by the Upper Arlington Civic League in 1923. The Civic League was in charge until the Upper Arlington Civic Association was formed in 1932 and took over in 1933.

From newspaper accounts in the early years, it seems that the General Chairman was selected each year by the UA Civic League/Association. Committee chairmen and committee members were then selected. It's not clear that there was an ascension plan as we know it today. In the early years, the General Chairperson was an individual and only that person is mentioned in the records. In later years, perhaps around the 1990s, spouses (when applicable) were also considered General Chairpersons and were reported that way. However, only one of the spouses represents the 4th of July as a UA Civic Association Director. The transition to a couples-chairmanship was probably an informal happening. In this list the General Chairs are listed as couples starting in 1990.

Field Day

Beginning in 1917 an event called Field Day was organized by Grandview, Marble Cliff and Upper Arlington. It took place in June each year and was a celebration of the tri-village communities and their residents. Events included a parade with floats and bands, sports contests, picnics, fireworks, music and dances. But, newspaper articles make no mention of Independence Day themes or purpose.

Field Day and UA's Fourth of July Celebration were similar events for different purposes. In fact, for a few years both events took place and were just two or three weeks apart. There really isn't anything to suggest that Field Day was an early version of the official UA celebration of the Fourth. It is safe to say that Field Day served as a model for the Upper Arlington Fourth of July Celebration which started in 1923.

Themes

In the early years it seems that themes were not a priority or perhaps the organizers didn't even think about it. When there was a theme it was more like a marketing slogan. For example, in 1926 it was reported that the celebration was being postponed until the Fall due to so many residents leaving town for the holiday. This prompted a theme/slogan that was used for several years, "A Stay at Home Fourth", that was used with publicity for citizens not to travel.

The first theme found in newspaper records was in 1932. There are many years after 1932 when a theme was not found in the records. In the 1950s float builders were encouraged to develop their own themes. From the Tri-Village News: "In formulating a theme, remember that the Arlington community is observing both Independence Day and homecoming" and "suggested themes for floats are homecoming, July 4, America, Ohio, family, neighbors, church, school and service." Themes were regularly reported starting in 1960.

Parade Grand Marshals

A parade marshal is a person who is in charge of arranging and assembling the participants in a parade. In the earliest years of the UA parade, marshals were named for each division as well as a Grand Marshal who was in charge of the marshaling (staging) area. At times the Grand Marshal led the parade from the staging area down the parade route. The Grand Marshal was often considered part of the planning committee. This may be the reason that the Grand Marshal wasn't regularly mentioned in the newspapers. Today, the Grand Marshal is a parade dignitary with a ceremonial role.

Cannon Salute at Dawn

Starting with the first celebration in 1923, a cannon salute took place at dawn to awaken the citizens, often accompanied by a flag raising ceremony. This continued until safety and fireworks regulations made it prohibitively difficult to arrange. It isn't clear when the last time this occurred but it was probably in the 1970s or 1980s.

Paul Revere's Ride (the morning wakeup call)

The tradition of Paul Revere's ride began in 1938. Vehicles with loud speakers drove through the neighborhoods to wake-up the residents. It was a call to assemble and that the Celebration is to begin.

Spirit of 76

The Spirit of 76 is a painting by Archibald MacNeal Willard an American painter who was born and reared in Bedford, Ohio. Willard painted *The Spirit of '76* in Wellington, Ohio. The painting depicts a Revolutionary War scene; however, he was inspired to create it after he saw three boys – two drummers and fife player – in a Fourth of July parade. The Upper Arlington Fourth of July recreation began in 1935 by Warren Park (piccolo/fife), Ted Wells (flag bearer), Bill Grover (drummer) and Russell Means (drummer boy). This is according to *History of Upper Arlington*.

Fourth of July Picnics and Cookouts

There is a tradition of mid-day feasts on Independence Day dating back to the late 1700's after independence in 1776. In the early years of UA, the organizers placed emphasis on mid-day picnics and sunset meals with friends. It was often even placed on the day's agenda. With UA's love of traditions, it is easy to believe that today's tradition of Fourth of July cookouts is due to the efforts in the early years.

Miss Arlington

The Miss Arlington program began in 1949. It was part of the Fourth of July Celebration and organized by the Fourth of July Committee. This is probably because the UA celebration was modeled after the Tri-Village Field Day which had a similar contest. Eventually the Miss Arlington contest was separated from the Fourth of July Committee but was still run by the UA Civic Association. The contest was aligned with the run-up to the Fourth of July and the Queen and her court were a feature in the parade. In 1998 the program was changed, was renamed the Junior Director Community Service and Scholarship Program, and was open to young men and woman; thus, ending the Miss Arlington program.
